A TRULY UNIQUE EVENT

This year more than 2,000 students from around 80 Catholic primary and secondary schools spend an 8-month learning journey preparing for their moment on stage.

The Festival is held in a professional setting every September, and each distinct performance features a senior primary massed choir supported by a combined secondary boys vocal ensemble, rhythm section and string ensemble. A variety of support acts comprising instrumental ensembles, vocal groups and solo artists selected by audition are interspersed between the choral program. In 2021 the Festival is celebrating its 33rd annual performance.

Founded by Sr Colleen Roberts RSJ, the first performance was held in St Peter's College Memorial Hall on August 16, 1989. On that occasion, 16 schools participated in the festival choir and five support acts performed. The following year it moved to the Adelaide Festival Theatre where it grew and remained for 27 years, and since 2001 has been held over four nights.

Since 2016, no two years have been the same. Weather events, renovations, and coronavirus have put adaptability, agility and flexibility at the core of our working philosophy. We've re-scheduled, re-imagined and reinvented the event. Across the last five years our students have been privileged to take to the stage of the Adelaide Festival Centre, the Adelaide Entertainment Centre, and attend a series of professional film recording sessions.

For over 20 years, CSMF Music Director Denise Rothall has successfully brought together all the elements to create an awe-inspiring show to entertain audiences of all ages.

It is widely recognised that the foundations for a healthy and well-rounded life are greatly influenced by the experiences we have in childhood. We also understand that positive engagement with the Arts can have particularly powerful and far-reaching benefits for children.

We are committed to provide an inspiring and educational journey for teachers and students alike through participation in our festival program.

As a choir trainer I have met some very remarkable colleagues who are willing to share their experiences and their wealth of knowledge.

It is also amazing that the founder of the Festival; Sister Colleen Roberts was the music teacher at St. Joseph's Murray Bridge all those years ago, inspiring both the Festival's current Music Director of over 20 years and I with music.


